INSTALL A BACKUP CARBON MONOXIDE DETECTOR

Many Tristate area homes already have a carbon monoxide (CO) detector. However, power outages and dead batteries can keep it from working, so make sure you have a battery-operated backup.

RECOGNIZE THE SIGNS OF CARBON MONOXIDE POISONING

Exposure can cause a headache, shortness of breath, dizziness, and nausea. It can also lead to blurred vision, mental confusion, hallucinations, memory problems, and unconsciousness.

DON'T USE FUEL-GENERATED DEVICES INSIDE

Any device that runs on gas, charcoal, or wood creates carbon monoxide. Never use generators, heaters, grills, or other fuel-powered devices inside without proper ventilation.

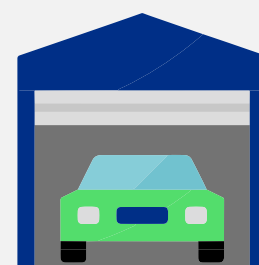
GET REGULAR HVAC MAINTENANCE

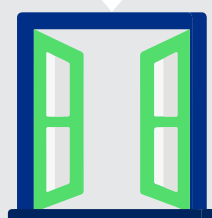
DON'T RUN VEHICLES INSIDE YOUR GARAGE

AVOID SETTING UP FUEL-POWERED DEVICES BY WINDOWS AND DOORS

When using generators or other combustion devices outside, make sure they're set up at least 20 feet away from doors, windows, and vents.
